Ladriano Z and Daniel Bluman Conquer \$215,900 Longines FEI Show Jumping World Cup



The road to Omaha became a bit clearer Saturday, as the world's best show jumpers took on the \$215,900 Longines FEI Show Jumping World Cup Lexington CSI4*-W at the 2022 National Horse Show. The highly anticipated event stole the spotlight Saturday evening, with 35 horse-and-rider combinations representing over ten countries competing for the top prize in the third leg of the North American series. In the end, it was Daniel Bluman (ISR) and Ladriano Z who took home the Longines timepiece and secured the top spot after an impressive double-clear effort.

Round one kicked off at 7:00 p.m. on the dot, with Kristen Vanderveen (USA) and Bull Run's Risen first out the in-gate. Vanderveen and the 16-year-old Dutch Warmblood gelding took down a rail on the first fence, and subsequently retired for the evening, setting an ominous tone in the Alltech Arena that kept the crowd at the edge of their seats all night long. The course set forth would prove to be challenging for all athletes, as many horse-and-rider combinations struggled to tackle the track designed by Guilherme Jorge (USA), which featured a handful of sharp bending-line variations, and one particularly difficult triple, all asking riders to account for their horse's adjustability as they approached every obstacle.



As the night progressed, more and more riders began to experience trouble with Jorge's tricky track. Of particular difficulty was the triple combination, which saw many rails down at fences seven-A and seven-B. Jos Verlooy (BEL) and Igor were lost in translation before the base of fence nine and failed to take the long spot, sending the pair crashing through the triple bar. The final oxer proved to be problematic for the athletes as well, causing what was a fault-free round to end in disappointment for Aaron Vale, Mark Bluman, Heather Caristo-Williams, Jessica Leto, and Shane Sweetnam, who had a nearly perfect ride before his mount, James Kann Cruz, nicked the back rail of the final fence, eliminating his hopes of bringing home the blue.

The audience wasn't able to witness a clear round until Devin Ryan (USA) entered the Alltech. Coming off his win from Thursday evening's international speed class, Ryan cleared the course with ease aboard Eddie Blue. Alish Cunniffe (USA) followed up with the second all clear round just six rides later aboard Vivaldi Du Theil. Santiago Lambre (BRA) and Chacco Blue II followed suit with the third clear round, back to back with Cunniffe. At the conclusion of round one, the original 35 horse-and-rider combinations had been whittled down to a slim seven pairs for the jump-off.

Tension mounted as the world's best show jumpers re-entered the Alltech Arena for round two. Ryan and the 13-year-old Dutch Warmblood gelding, Eddie Blue, came back into focus at the start of the jump-off, setting the bar high and posting a double clear round time of 37.84 seconds. Cunniffe was second to contest, but opted to retire and save her 13-year-old Selle Francais gelding for another day after the first few fences. Lambre and the 15-year-old stallion contested third, crossing the Longines timers at 37.55 seconds, but knocked a rail at fence 12-A to land the pair in fifth place at the conclusion of the class.

Bluman and Over 'The Top Stables' 14 year-old Zangersheide gelding crossed under the Longines and National Horse Show arc prepared to give the Lexington crowd a show, as he secured the win with a jump-off time of 35.13 seconds. "My plan was to do a little bit of what I saw [Devin Ryan] did and try to edge him in the turns. Then when I was about to go in, my cousin Mark told me to do nine [strides] from the wall to the liverpool, and that's pretty much how it worked out," explained Bluman. "Jump number three was a very difficult jump in the jump-off because the horse spooks at the wall. My plan was not to take a big risk, but then I just did."

It was a battle for the top three as Holloway and her 11-year-old Westphalian mare and Dello Joio and his 10-year-old Warmblood gelding fought for the top prize. Crossing the timers at 35.99 seconds and 35.47 seconds respectively, the duos were only able to shake up the second and third place rankings. The final ride of the night went to show jumping veteran Pessoa and his nine-year-old Hanoverian gelding, who finished the class with a time of 38.52 seconds and four faults to ultimately land them in sixth place behind Lambre.

The National Horsemanship Championship for the ASPCA Alfred B. Maclay Trophy



It is called the “proving ground of champions” and the ultimate test for America’s young riders. Those who win it often go on to ride professionally, and the roster of winners reads like a who’s who of equestrian sports. For spectators, it is poetry in motion, where horse and rider seem to float effortlessly through difficult maneuvers. For the young competitors, it is about grace and style and a tremendous amount of dedication and hard work...

The ASPCA Maclay, a championship class at the National Horse Show, was initiated in 1933 by Alfred B. Maclay, an ASPCA board member, accomplished horseman and president of the National Horse Show. Maclay conceived of a trophy that would inspire young riders to develop the best horsemanship skills and instill in them respect and compassion for their equine partners.

Maclay, an officer of the ASPCA and President of the National Horse Show from 1922-1924. The Horsemanship Championship is one of the most prestigious competitions for Junior riders in the United States. Its winners are some of the biggest names in equestrian sport.

Over the years the ASPCA Maclay Finals have been termed the 'proving ground of champions' and the ultimate test for America's young riders. And in the case of this classic test of horsemanship skills, that's certainly more fact than hype.

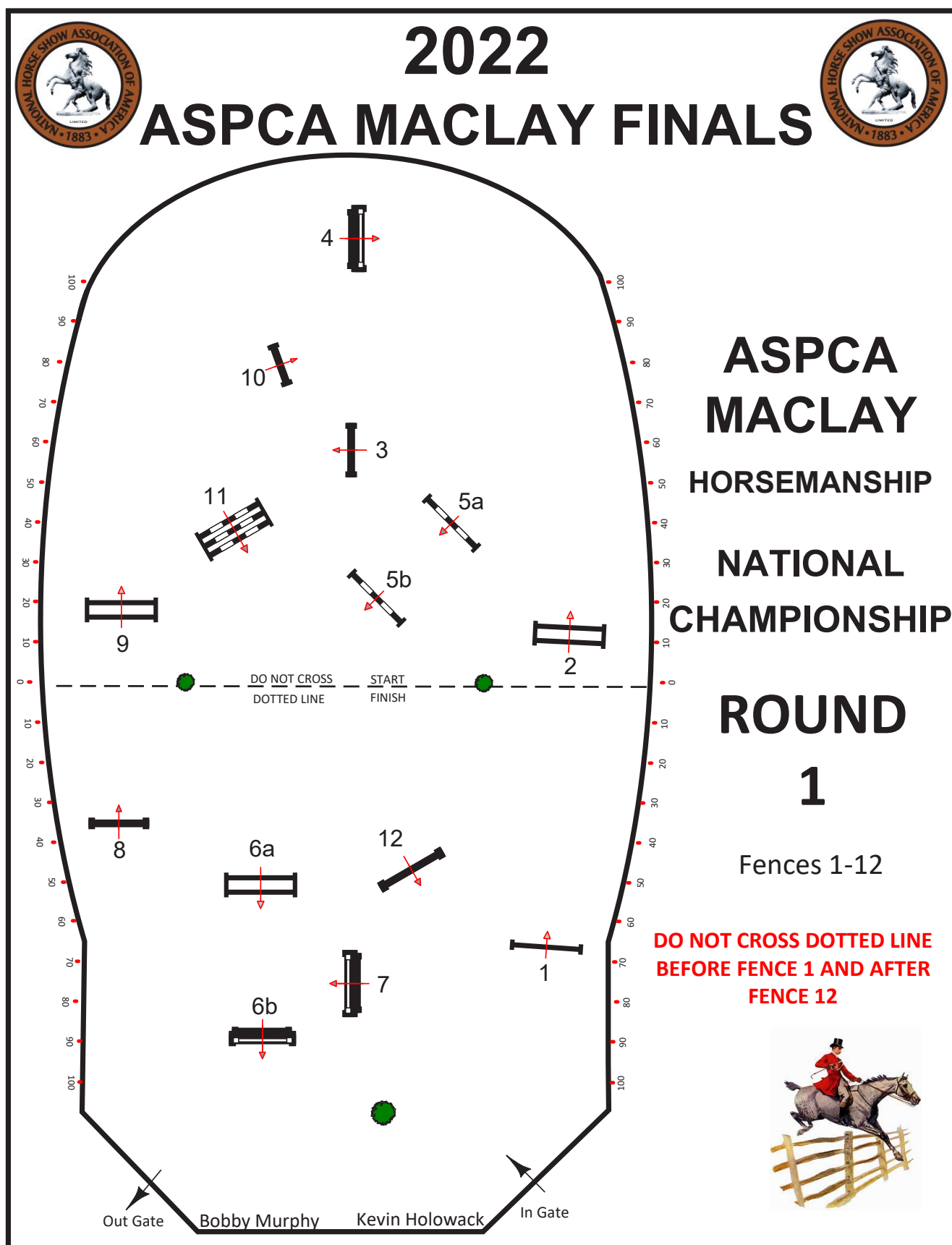

Que Sera and Elliot Bring Home Blue from \$10,000 Hunter Classics to Close out Hunter Competition



The nation's top children and adult amateur hunter athletes battled for the inaugural championship title in the \$10,000 Children's Hunter Classic and \$10,000 Adult Amateur Hunter Classic.

Each horse-and-rider combination jumped the first 10-obstacle round designed by Bobby Murphy (USA), which showcased a myriad of traditional hunter features, including various five-stride to two-stride lines and lofty oxers. Murphy's track challenged both horses and riders, asking the athletes to showcase their mount's conformation and adjustability while maintaining poise and classic hunter demeanor. Judges awarded points based on each horse's ability to maneuver the course, and invited back the top 12 horse-and-rider combinations to show in a second round to decide who would be crowned winner.

At the end of the day, it was Que Sera, a six-year-old Belgian Warmblood gelding, and Emma Rupinski of Saint Louis, MO, who took the top spot in the Children's Hunter Classic, after accumulating a score of 173 points after two breathtaking rounds. Breckenridge, a 15-year-old Holsteiner gelding, and Abigail Gordon of Statesville, NC, came in second with a combined score of 171.

The adult amateurs entered the Alltech around midday, where the audience witnessed Elliot and Kendall Meijer of Grand Rapids, MI, steal the lead by a fraction of a margin – Meijer beat the runner-up by three-quarters of a point to bring home blue with 173.75 points aboard the nine-year-old Selle Francais gelding owned by Copper Fox LLC. In second was Freedom and Jeanine Cash, of Winthrop, MA, with a combined score of 173 points.



Royce Races to Win \$25,000 Show Jumping Hall of Fame Amateur-Owner/Junior Jumper Grand Prix



Serving as the Show Jumping Hall of Fame (SJHOF) Year-End Championship, the National Horse Show is the final stop on the East Conference for the prestigious program. Capping off their year with a win, Hailey Royce and Sonic Boom bested the 23 horse-and-rider field to lead the victory gallop at the conclusion of the class.

The Show Jumping Hall of Fame Jumper Classic Series has held its championship final at the National Horse Show for more than 30 years. The series is designed to provide junior and amateur riders with opportunities to compete at the highest level of their divisions, and hosts separate divisions for junior and amateur riders across two conferences: the East Conference, presented by Rood & Riddle, and the West Conference, presented by LAURACEA. The series culminates in year-end finals; west coast conference finals are held at Blenheim's International Jumping Festival, while east coast conference finals are held at the National Horse Show. Winning riders receive an engraved Tiffany crystal trophy from the Show Jumping Hall of Fame.

Over the years, the prestigious title and Tiffany trophy has been awarded to riders such as Brianne Goutal, Laura Chapot, and Reed Kessler. Recognized for their excellence throughout the 2022 series, Zayna Rizvi with her mount Excellent earned the tri-color in the 2022 junior division, and Emma Catherine Reichow rode her own Forever Alve to victory for the series' amateur division.

Guilherme Jorge (BRA) set a technical first round track, challenging the talented field of athletes to apply all of their well practiced skills from the season. At the end of the first round, seven horse-and-athlete pairs advanced to the jump-off. The short course consisted of three options for inside turns and a long, unrelated bending line with an option to leave out a stride.

Baylee McKeever and McLain Ward's Formidable were first to jump clear in round one. Returning first for the jump-off, they immediately turned up the pressure on their competitors, posting an incredibly quick, clear round. McKeever demonstrated experience beyond her years as she piloted the 12-year-old KWPN mare to an easy double clear effort, ultimately crossing through the timers in 37.131 seconds. They duo held a short lead until Royce and Sonic Boom came in to challenge their time.

Royce rode two confident and powerful rounds aboard the 10-year-old Belgian Warmblood gelding owned by Double Clear LLC. The duo galloped into the Alltech ready to challenge McKeever's time. Making every inside turn, Royce left a stride out of each turn and rode Sonic Boom perfectly to the base allowing him to pat the ground and jump an effortless clear and fast round to take the lead. They landed over the last careful vertical and made it through the timers in a blazing 36.691 seconds.



Augusta Iwasaki and Fresca were the fourth pair to jump off. To claim the blue in the competitive class, they needed to best Royce's time and leave all of the rails intact. Though Iwasaki rode the KWPN mare the fastest time in the jump-off phase, they had an unfortunate rail that ultimately secured their third place position.

The two Junior champions are here with us so please welcome to the ring Skylar Wireman, who won the West Conference on her horse, Karen, and Zayna Rizvi, the East Conference champion for the second consecutive year. Zayna won the division on Chaplin W, while also placing second on Excellent, the horse with whom she won the division last year.
